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Why this guide?

Social and emotional learning (SEL) is fundamental for PreK-12 students, because it equips them with essential life skills that help students lead healthy lives now and in the future. By focusing on self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision-making, SEL helps students navigate their emotions, build healthy relationships, and make sound choices. These skills contribute to improved academic performance, reduced behavioral issues, and enhanced mental well-being. SEL empowers students for success in both their personal and professional futures.

This guide is designed to be a helpful resource for districts choosing an SEL curriculum. SEL curriculum can be long and cumbersome to review, so this guide provides easy-to-read snapshot summaries of some commonly available options. It does not cover every SEL curriculum, but it highlights several that schools can readily implement. These summaries can help a district decide whether to explore a curriculum further or rule it out during the full review process. Districts may wish to use the CASEL Program Guide as another useful tool when selecting an SEL curriculum.

Effective systemic SEL implementation relies on a well-informed plan and continuous improvement. The <u>CASEL's Districtwide SEL Action Planning Workbook</u> can be utilized when adopting an SEL curriculum, offering a roadmap to outline annual benchmarks and details for a phased rollout strategy across the district. Thinking about these steps early will contribute significantly to the successful integration of your chosen SEL curriculum.

There are many resources that can aid districts in selecting SEL curriculum, such as the <u>Health Education Curriculum Analysis Tool (HECAT)</u>, a self-assessment tool that can be used in the health education curriculum selection process. The <u>CASEL Selecting an Evidence-Based Program tool</u> from the <u>CASEL Guide to Schoolwide SEL</u> can assist districts in determining their SEL Goals and provides a tool for comparing evidence-based programs. If you already are utilizing a SEL curriculum, consider this <u>priority planning tool</u> to evaluate your current implementation.

Each snapshot includes key details of the curriculum like the intended grade levels, lesson count and duration, and curriculum cost. It also gives a quick overview of the program's structure, highlighting features such as educators' scripts, assessment components, and more.

To evaluate a curriculum's fit and feasibility, consider using the <u>Hexagon Tool</u>. Districts might find it helpful to use a structured process or document to record feedback during SEL curriculum reviews. Here are some examples of curriculum review templates:

Be Good People is a teacher-friendly, comprehensive SEL curriculum developed by Nick van Oss at the Minnesota School District. It is continuously refined and improved through teacher feedback. This free, accessible curriculum is based on the CASEL framework and utilizes user-friendly platforms like Google Docs, Slides, and embedded videos.

The curriculum includes example schedules for PreK-12th grade and pacing guides, with flexibility to customize lessons and activities to meet the specific needs of teachers, students, and classrooms. Lessons are designed to teach skills step-by-step and apply them to relevant scenarios. Extension activities, such as videos, discussion questions, and worksheets, are also included. Additionally, communitybuilding activities feature "get-to-know-you" questions and simple games. Each grade band includes a teacher training and coaching resource page with handouts, videos, printable posters, or cards when applicable. Clicking on a lesson provides access to a Google Drive folder containing all necessary materials, including a comprehensive lesson plan, homework, parent/guardian school-home notes, worksheets, and posters. An example schedule for all grades links lesson slides, optional extension activities, and community-building exercises, along with printable materials.

Caring School Community (CSC) is an evidence-based, comprehensive social-emotional learning (SEL) curriculum for K-8 students, developed by Collaborative Classroom. It aligns with the CASEL framework and incorporates restorative practices to foster positive relationships and a sense of community within schools. The program is structured for 30 weeks, with 30-minute daily and weekly lessons, and includes various activities such as morning and closing circles, class meetings, and student pairings. Through these practices, CSC aims to help students develop personal core values, prosocial behaviors, social skills, and a strong sense of community, while also equipping teachers with proactive classroom management strategies.

Each grade level receives a teacher package that includes a seven-year digital license and necessary implementation tools. Resources provided may include a Teacher's Manual, Community Chats, books, a Discipline Guide, an Assessment Resource Book, and materials for cross-age buddy activities and subject-area integration. Spanish-language student materials and a digital license to a learning portal are also available.

Move This World (MTW) is a comprehensive CASEL Promising Social Emotional Learning (SEL) curriculum. MTW provides differentiated interventions for Tier 1 and Tier 2. The Tier 1 curriculum includes grade specific video and movement based lessons with scripted discussions. Tier 2 is a grade band intervention (early elem., late elem., middle school, high school) designed for small groups of students with scaffolding from the Tier 1 curriculum. CASEL'S SEL FRAMEWORK:

What AretheCoreCompetenceAreas and Where Are They Promoted?

Social and emotional learning (SEL) is an integral part of education and human development. SEL is the process through which all young people and adults acquire and apply the knowledge, skills, and attitudes to develop healthy identities, manage emotions and achieve personal and collective goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain supportive relationships, and make responsible and caring decisions.

SEL advances educational equity and excellence through authentic school-family-community partnerships to establish learning environments and experiences that feature trusting and collaborative relationships, rigorous and meaningful curriculum and instruction, and ongoing evaluation. SEL can help address various forms of inequity and empower young people and adults to cocreate thriving schools and contribute to safe, healthy, and just communities.







THE CASEL 5:

The CASEL 5 addresses five broad, interrelated areas of competence and examples for each: self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationshipskills, and responsible decision-making. The CASEL 5 can be taught and applied at various developmental stages from childhood to adulthood and across diverse cultural contexts to articulate what students should know and be able to do for academic success, school and civic engagement, health and wellness, and fulfilling careers.

SELF-AWARENESS: The abilities to understand one's own SELF-MANAGEMENT: The abilities to manage one's emoemotions, thoughts, and values and how they influence behavior across contexts. This includes capacities to recognize one's strengths and limitations with a wellgrounded sense of confidence and purpose. Such as:

- Integrating personal and social identities
- Identifying personal, cultural, and linguistic assets
- Identifying one's emotions
- Demonstrating honesty and integrity
- Linking feelings, values, and thoughts
- Examining prejudices and biases
- Experiencing self-efficacy
- Having a growth mindset

RESPONSIBLE DECISION-MAKING: The abilities to make caring and constructive choices about personal behavior and social interactions across diverse situations. This includes the capacities to consider ethical standards and safety concerns, and to evaluate the benefits and consequences of various actions for personal, social, and collective well-being. Such as:

- Demonstrating curiosity and open-mindedness
- Identifying solutions for personal and social problems
- Learning to make a reasoned judgment after analyzing information, data, facts
- Anticipating and evaluating the consequences of one's. actions
- Recognizing how critical thinking skills are useful both inside & outside of school
- Reflecting on one's role to promote personal, family, and community well-being
- Evaluating personal, interpersonal, community, and institutional impacts

THE KEY

Our framework takes a systemic approach that emphasizes the importance of establishing equitable learning environments and coordinating practices across key settings to enhance all students' social, emotional, and academic learning. We believe it is most beneficial to integrate SEL throughout the school's academic curricula and culture, across the broader contexts of schoolwide practices and policies, and through ongoing collaboration with families and community organizations. These coordinated efforts should foster youth voice, agency, and engagement; establish supportive classroom and school climates and SETTINGS: approaches to discipline; enhance adult SEL competence; and establish authentic family and community partnerships.

CLASSROOMS. Research has shown that social and emotional competence can be enhanced using a variety of clasroom- based approaches such as: (a) explicit instruction through which social and emotional skills and attitudes are taught and prac- ticed in developmentally, contextually, and culturally responsive ways; (b) teaching practices such as cooperative learning and projectbased learning; and (c) integration of SEL and academic curriculum such as language arts, math, science, social stud- ies, health, and performing arts. High-quality SEL instruction has four elements represented by the acronym SAFE: Sequenced - following a coordinated set of training approaches to foster the development of competencies; Active - emphasizing active forms of learning to help students practice and master new skills; Focused - implementing curriculum that intentionally emphasizes the development of SEL competencies; and Explicit - defining and targeting specific skills, attitudes, and knowledge.

SEL instruction is carried out most effectively in nurturing, safe environments characterized by positive, caring relationships among students and teachers. To facilitate age-appropriate and culturally responsive instruction, adults must understand and appreciate the unique strengths and needs of each student and support students' identities. When adults incorporate students' personal experiences and cultural backgrounds and seek their input, they create an inclusive classroom environment where students are partners in the educational process, elevating their own agency. Strong relationships between adults and students can facilitate co-learning, foster student and adult growth, and generate collaborative solutions to shared concerns.

SCHOOLS. Effectively integrating SEL schoolwide involves ongoing planning, implementation, evaluation, and continuous improvement by all members of the school community. SEL efforts both contribute to and depend upon a school climate where all students and adults feel respected, supported, and engaged.

Because the school setting includes many contexts—classrooms, hallways, cafeteria, playground, bus—fostering a healthy school climate and culture requires active engagement from all adults and students. A strong school culture is rooted in students' sense of belonging, with evidence that suggests that it plays a crucial role in students' engagement. SEL also offers an opportunity to enhance existing systems of student support by integrating SEL goals and practices with universal, targeted, and intensive academic and behavioral supports. By coordinating and building upon SEL practices and programs, schools can create an environment that infuses SEL into every part of students' educational experience and promotes positive social, emotional, and academic outcomes for all students.

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THE KEY SETTINGS (CONT.

FAMILIES/CAREGIVERS. When schools and families form authentic partnerships, they can build strong connections that reinforce students' social and emotional development. Families and caregivers are children's first teachers, and bring deep expertise about their development, experiences, culture, and learning needs. These insights and perspectives are critical to informing, supporting, and sustaining SEL efforts. Research suggests that evidence-based SEL programs are more effective when they extend into the home, and families are far more likely to form partnerships with schools when their schools' norms, values, and cultural representations reflect their own experiences. Schools need inclusive decision-making processes that ensure that families—particularly those from historically marginalized groups—are part of planning, implementing, and continuously improving SEL.

Schools can also create other avenues for family partnership that may include creating ongoing two-way communication with families, helping caregivers understand child development, helping teachers understand family backgrounds and cultures, providing opportunities for families to volunteer in schools, extending learning activities and discussions into homes, and coordinating family services with community partners. These efforts should engage families in understanding, experiencing, informing, and supporting the social and emotional development of their students.

COMMUNITIES. Community partners often provide safe and developmentally rich settings for learning and development,

have a deep understanding of community needs and assets, are seen as trusted partners by families and students, and have connections to additional supports and services that school and families need. Community programs also offer opportunities for young people to practice their social and emotional skills in settings that are both personally relevant and can open opportunities for their future. To integrate SEL efforts across the school day and out-of-school time, school staff and community partners should align on common language and coordinate strategies and communication around SEL-related efforts and initiatives.

Students, families, schools, and communities are all part of broader systems that shape learning, development, and experiences. Inequities based on race, ethnicity, class, language, gender identity, sexual orientation, and other factors are deeply ingrained in the vast majority of these systems and impact young people and adult social, emotional, and academic learning. While SEL alone will not solve longstanding and deep-seated inequities in the education system, it can create the conditions needed for individuals and schools to examine and interrupt inequitable policies and practices, create more inclusive learning environments, and reveal and nurture the interests and assets of all individuals.
